British Airways in major expansion at Cardiff Airport

British Airways has announced a multi-million-pound investment in its maintenance engineering facility at Cardiff Airport. The airline said it will expand one of three existing maintenance bays at the site to facilitate its larger longhaul Airbus A350 aircraft.

This will create a second fully flexible bay, allowing more complex work to be completed. The base can currently only serve Boeing 777 and 787 aircraft.

The expansion, part of BA's £7bn transformation, will start next year and is expected to be completed by 2026.

Some 480 people are employed by the carrier in the Vale of Glamorgan.
