## Devon visitor attraction, billed as UK's 'oldest home', up for sale

Britain's "oldest home", in Devon, has gone on the market for the first time in 120 years.

Kents Cavern, in Torquay dates back to the prehistoric age. The freehold property includes UNESCO protected caves, which have been open to the public since the 19th century.

The property, caves and business, which have been owned by the same family since 1903, are being marketed by Bettesworths Chartered Surveyors at a guide price of £2-£2.5m.

Kents Cavern, described as "one of the most important Stone Age sites in Europe", was formed over 2.5m years ago.

What a fantastic chance to purchase a very different but hugely successful freehold business with extensive assets, all in a fabulous location, minutes from the beautiful coastline of Torbay and South Devon."
