A chicken abattoir in North Wales that supplies KFC, Nando's and major supermarkets is looking to take on 60 new apprentices.

2 Sisters Food Group's UK Poultry site in Sandycroft, in collaboration with Coleg Cambria, have announced a commitment to boost employment and skills in the Flintshire region by offering apprenticeships to up to 60 people over the next 12 months.

The firm is now recruiting for an initial cohort of 20 new apprentices to join and start their careers — starting on a standard weekly wage of £355 — plus the potential to earn £393 per week after just 12 weeks as well as getting staff benefits.

They would join a new Butchery Academy Apprenticeship programme with Coleg Cambria with educational support over a 15 month period as they gain their qualification.
