Working Wales will become the gateway into the Guarantee. They will also trial a new Job Matching service, to assist young people with securing employment and help employers to fill vacancies.

In addition, the dialogue and collaboration between the Welsh

Government, education, the training sector, employers and public authorities will be strengthened through the expansion of our Regional Skills Partnerships.

National and regional employment and skills providers across Wales will be invited to connect with Working Wales so projects can form part of the offer.
